
As well as competing, we also managed to enjoy the sights and experiences Monterrey had to offer, thoroughly enjoying our stay in Mexico!

Swimming

I am very proud of all the competitors that took part in a swimming gala against Cheltenham Ladies' College. Each school can enter two swimmers in each event and points are awarded according to the finishing positions. This year we are lucky to have nine swimmers who belong to the City of Hereford Swimming Club. Phoebe Ruck came first in the 50m breaststroke with a time of 41.34 seconds. Freyer Phelps won the 50m backstroke in 37.29 and Jasmine Holt won both the 25m butterfly in 15.75 and the 50m front crawl in 33.32.

The points were totalled for each age group with JK U12s winning by 1 point and U13s by 4 points. The scores for the relays and the open event meant that we lost the overall event, John Kyrle scoring 81 to Cheltenham Ladies' 91. Many of the swimmers were dropped off at Ross swimming pool to continue training with the squad. I would like to say thank you to Mr John who was a great help on the pool side making sure the swimmers were in the correct lanes before the event.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

In the months leading up to Christmas, Years 7 & 8 students were busy decorating shoe boxes and collecting lots of small Christmas present items to fill them. Small, practical items such as toothbrushes and gloves are also added to the boxes which are part of the Operation Christmas Child appeal. Samaritan's Purse have been running this appeal for over 20 years, to provide many less well-off children in developing and war-torn countries some joy at Christmas time.



Thanks to the students' generosity and organisation by school staff, many boxes were prepared and passed on to the collection point in Hereford in order to be sent off to 2016's destinations.

The group spent around an hour learning about both the history and the features of the Synagogue. Although the Synagogue was first opened in 1839 many of the fixtures and fittings are older (dating from around 1760) with the Ark, Bimah and Pews being donated by a London community whose Synagogue was being re-ordered.

A-level RS is a popular option at JKHS; last summer 100% of students achieved A*-B grades in the subject.





Outstanding History Projects



Throughout the Autumn Term, Year 9 have been constructing trench diaries as part of their work on World War One. It has been especially powerful this year, with the centenary of the Battle of the Somme leading to a special focus on that infamous battle.

As always, the Year 9 John Kyrle students treated the topic with respect and reverence and produced some exceptional work.

Alongside their lessons, the students were required to empathise with the soldiers on the Western Front to create a trench diary charting the life of a British or German soldier. Apart from some advice and examples, the students were given a creative licence to take the project in whatever direction they chose. This led to some remarkable work!

Over 200 diaries were submitted, each showing their own flair and individuality. From soldiers being thrilled by the chance of becoming a hero and volunteering in the first few days, to others reluctantly conscripted in the later stages of the war, the students really thrived with the freedom they were given. Not only did they use the knowledge they gained in lessons, but they also completed extensive research outside the classroom.



Two pupils from 9 H particularly stood out for their efforts. Katie Smith and Emily Davies both created pieces of work which required hours of research, an incredible imagination and dedication to the task. I believe these two deserved a special mention due to their commitment to the task and desire to research and investigate the experiences of millions of soldiers. They are already formidable historians and have a bright future in the subject as they both look to continue their studies at GCSE.

This project provoked many emotions for both the students and myself. Many felt proud to remember those who had fallen and sacrificed their lives for others, whilst others felt a degree of sadness for the fate of the character they had created, acknowledging that their fiction was ingrained with reality.

I found myself moved when marking the diaries due to the amount of endeavour and commitment the students showed. I felt that not only did the task improve and enhance their historical skills, but was a fine tribute to the memories of those who had fallen.

CRIO Olympic Equestrian Stadium Diadora

I consider it a huge privilege to have been able to go to Rio De Janeiro and in contrast to a normal 'holiday', I was fortunate enough to witness the world's first-ever South American Olympic Games. Of course, after the spectacular games of London in 2012, Rio had a tough act to follow.


It was thought highly unlikely that an LEDC (low economically developed country) like Brazil, with minimal facilities and a lack of financial support, would be able to compete with Britain's previous games. As melancholy as it makes me to tell you, this proved to be true, demonstrated by a lack of infrastructure around the games' sites and scaffolding over half-finished stadia.

There is a contrast between the image most people have of Rio and the reality. The shameful truth is that it's really not what you may think. Behind the beautiful image of clear-blue ocean and bright-yellow sand of Copacabana, there's something that is never shown, but sadly I saw every day. Looking left from Copacabana out of my window, I saw people carrying cardboard, which I later learned were their beds. I saw people outside the food shops just sitting there with crying children and begging for something to eat. I found it so strange how two different worlds could be so close.

I don't want to contradict the fact that the Olympics in Rio were, by all means, incredible. I just get the sense that the country wasn't in an economic position to hold the world's largest sporting competition. It caused a huge level of protesting throughout the city of Rio, arguing that the money used for the Olympics, could be put to better use.

A shocking fact for you is that 50% of people in Rio de Janeiro do not have access to running water, a rather startling figure really isn't it? Maybe the large sum used for the games could instead have supported the country with major issues affecting its people, such as healthcare.

However, it has to be said, Rio did pull it off. All in all it was a fantastic games. Most of the structures that were built were incredible. In particular, the white water rafting course, which I was lucky enough to go and see, was fantastic The stadium had a beautiful view overlooking the whole of Diadora, which was where a lot of the events were situated in Brazil.



NATIONAL CANOE SLALON UPDATE

A group of JKHS students who attend Wyedean Canoe Club have been taking part in canoe slalom in national competitions and have been making rapid progress through the national ranking system. Last March we featured several of these students who had been selected to join the Southern Regional Talent Squad.



Canoe Slalom is not age categorised. All ages have to compete against each other and adults within separate male and female divisions. This is to ensure every competitor reaches the same standard to be allowed to move on to more challenging white water for safety reasons The league system is similar to the football league with a premier division followed by divisions 1 to 4. To reach division 3, athletes need to have gained a good level of competence and fitness. To reach division 2, athletes need to be training regularly (2 to 3 times per week) and be finishing in the top 3 in 5 races. To reach Division 1, athletes need regular training and access to the artificial white water courses built for the Olympics and World Cups at Lee Valley, Cardiff and Holme Pierrepont (HPP).

For four of the nine days I was there, I had to catch a number of metro trains (like the underground system we have) to get to Deodora to watch the events. It was not untidy, unhygienic or indeed badly organised. However, I am not a fan of crowds and as you can imagine, there was a huge number of people trying to get on (I'm presuming to watch the events or just to go to work). I found it rather uncomfortable, it's just the way I am I guess.

It's quite the antithesis of Britain in some ways. For example, on the metro, people are so open and willing to talk to you, unlike places like London where people just put their heads down and make no effort to start a conversation with you. In Rio, roughly 90% of people speak good English, whereas here in England most people only speak English and very rarely another language fluently.

Finally, I just want to say what a beautiful country Brazil is, and how much it's trying to progress from the current state that it's in. We, as a nation and individually, can learn so much from Brazil by looking to the future and striving to achieve more. In fact as our school motto states 'Carpe Diem'.

Through all the poverty, gun crime and violence, there is a light at the end of the tunnel for this amazing country, for

'Tomorrow belongs to those who prepare for it today'.

By using SMHW teachers can ensure that students and parents/carers always have the information they need about homework, available via the web, mobile and tablet devices.

Show my Homework has great benefits for students:

- view homework due on a to-do list and stay organised by marking off tasks as they are completed
- receive automated reminders before homework is due
- it's accessible 24/7, with a useful free app available for iPhone, iPad, iPod Touch and Android

It's even possible to view homework without needing to log in! However, for students to fully access their account, they will only need their school email details.

Parents are able to create a parent account ready-linked to all childrens' homework calendars, and have received a letter with instructions for setting up an account in the Autumn term.

The Show My Homework brand was launched 5 years ago, and it has grown enormously (1500 schools in 23 countries use the software every day) and has evolved multiple products and services.

SMHW has been well received within the school, by students and staff alike, and we are sure it will continue to be an asset for the school community as a whole.

The winning teams are the ones that the specialist judges consider to have the best organisation, structure and delivery of speeches, as well as the best response to challenges from the other team. The other teams were also very good: two boys represented Fairfield and bravely argued against the students from Hereford Cathedral on the subject of footballers' wages. It was discovered afterwards that they were only in Y9 - a tremendous achievement to debate in such a competitive


