Switzerland

- *Die Schweiz* is the third biggest German speaking country with around 8.5 million people.
- It has 4 official languages. In order of how many speakers: German (*Schwyzer Deutsch*), French, Italian and a form of Romanian
- Switzerland has a tradition of neutrality – and a huge number of international organisations and multinational companies are based there for that reason.
